Admissions and Application Requirements

The OTA program is a 1+1 program. Students are required to complete all Phase I courses before applying to Phase II. Phase II is a selective admissions process, and completion of Phase I does not guarantee admission into Phase II.

Phase I Enrollment Requirements

Enrollment requirements are upon acceptance into Phase II, unless requested by the facility where you are completing observation hours.

- CPR certification
- Criminal record check
- Child abuse history clearance (for PA placements only)

Phase II Enrollment Requirements

- Successful completion of all Phase I courses with a grade of C or better.
- Minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 for all Phase I courses
- Professional interview.
- Minimum of 8 volunteer observation hours.*
- Deadline to apply: April 15
